Economics Major Interns at Brokerage Firm

This past summer I was lucky enough to be hired as an intern at Beecher Carlson's Boston office. Beecher Carlson is an insurance and risk management brokerage, handling the insurance matters of energy companies. After the initial excitement of acquiring an internship in Boston began to wear off, I realized I had little knowledge of the insurance industry and began to grow nervous.

My fears immediately disappeared as I received a tour of the office on my first day. I was introduced to a small group of young professionals who loved their jobs and working with their fellow Beecher Carlson employees. Throughout the span of the internship, I had the opportunity to have extended conversations with each employee, offering me useful advice concerning school and the business world. The employees were always accommodating, taking me out to lunch and allowing me to sit in on important meetings. The small office setting and personable employees made my transition into the business world a pleasant learning experience.

Although I entered my internship having little understanding of insurance, I was quickly taught how Beecher Carlson operates and was given tasks and projects that facilitated this process. I often handled and corrected a number of different insurance documents, offering me a glimpse into the types of energy companies that Beecher Carlson works with. For instance, I was assigned to read through an insurance claim for a blown turbine at an energy company in the Midwest and create a chart for a senior vice president. Perhaps the most exciting project I completed was related to the Gulf Oil Spill. I was asked to perform research and give a detailed report on several prospective oil companies in the Texas that may have been affected by the spill. The assignments I was given allowed me to learn about the insurance industry while positively contributing to the success of Beecher Carlson.



Leo Kahane earned his bachelor's degree in Economics and Social Sciences from the University of California at Berkeley. He earned his Master's and PhD degrees in economics from Columbia University in New York City. He has published numerous research papers in a variety of fields, including the political economy of voting and policy formation, the economics of crime, and sports economics. Leo is the author of an introductory econometrics textbook and is a co-editor of a two-volume set of handbooks on sports economics due to be published by Oxford University Press in 2011. He is also the co-founder and editor-in-chief of the Journal of Sports Economics, now in its 11th year of publication. Most important

among all of Leo's accomplishments, however, is the role he plays as dad to his two sons, Jacob and Zoe, and husband to Cathy, his beautiful wife.

Angela Dills graduated from the University of Virginia with a bachelor's degree in economics and Spanish.
