The Charles G. Koch Foundation renewed a grant for **Angela Dills** to bring in guest speakers to talk about liberty as well as to help fund a student economics book club. A paper Professor Dills wrote with Sean Mulholland, Juliana Carattini, and Rachel Sederberg entitled "Catholic Schools, Competition, and Public School Quality," appeared in the October 2012 issue of *Economics Letters*. She also gave a talk on higher education issues in the presidential election for the College Board's Institute on Financial Aid.

At the Western Economic Association conference in San Francisco, CA this summer, **Professor Leo Kahane** chaired a session on the Economics of Hockey including his paper "Wages and Marginal Revenue Product in the NHL Pre- and Post-Lockout". He also served as a discussant at the meetings.

Professor Alan Kessler discussed a paper at the Western Economic Association meetings in San Francisco in July 2012.

Professor MaryJane Lenon published the paper "Healthy Spending: Connecticut: High Costs, Below Average Growth," with Dennis Heffley in the Fall 2012 issue of *The Connecticut Economy*.

On October 17, 2012, **Professor O'Brien**, in conjunction with Commissioner Paul Chabot of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, conducted a seminar in "Advanced Steward Training" at the Institute for Labor Studies and Research in Cranston, RI. Professor O'Brien addressed the attendees on the issues of "Past Practice", "Employee Discipline", and the "Arbitration Process." A stimulating question and answer period followed the presentations.

bers from the labor-management community throughout New England, as well as third party neutrals attended the event. Special awards were present to management representative Gary St. Peter, Esq. and to labor


representative Mary Riley for their outstanding contributions to the cause of industrial peace. Professor O'Brien served as conference chairman.
