Speaker Series Spring 2011

With generous funding from the Charles G. Koch Foundation, the economics department hosted two guest speakers this semester: Professor Ben Powell (right) of Suffolk University and Professor Steve Horwitz of St. Lawrence University.

On February 7, Dr. Powell defended sweatshops and discussed how anti-sweatshop activists' activities could reduce Third World employment and investment. His talk generated a stir on campus, with several opinion pieces concerning his talk appearing in *The Cowl*. On March 31, Dr. Horwitz discussed how economic growth and the market order have changed the nature of family. Both talks were well attended by our economics students and other members of the PC community.



Annual John H. Fanning Conference

The Quirk Institute will be hosting its annual John H. Fanning Conference on June 23, 2011 from 9 am to 4 pm. The Quirk Institute, directed by Professor Francis O'Brien serves as a neutral forum within which members of the labor and management communities, as well as representatives of public agencies, can meet and discuss those issues which affect the collective bargaining process. The annual conference explores timely issues related to labor and management relation.

Will Short is graduating as a Quantitative Economics major and Finance minor. Next year he will be working through Teach for America as a secondary school mathematics teacher in Los Angeles, California. The Teach for America program is a two-year commitment that places re-

cent graduates as well as seasoned professionals in low-income school districts to teach grades ranging from kindergarten to 12th grade.

During this commitment he will be pursuing a Master's degree in Urban Education from Loyola Marymount University. Will credits PC Economics for helping him to "think about the issues as far as allocation of funds for education, and also helped solidify a strong math background from which [he] was able to land a job."

Lillian Glueck is starting the Contracts Leadership Development program, a 2 year rotational program at Raytheon. Her first assignment is to Raytheon Technical Services Company in Dulles, VA starting this summer. Lillian noted that "One great aspect of majoring in economics is that it doesn't dictate a particular career. You have so many options open to you as an economics major."
