Career Workshops for Economics Majors and Minors

The Economics Department has partnered with Career Services in a new program to help our majors and minors prepare for entry into the job market. Dr. MaryJane Lenon and Eileen Wisnewski of Career Services held the first of a series of workshops in October targeting senior economics major and minors. The well-attended workshop focused on resume writing and job market search techniques. Dr. Lenon has worked with individual economics students in the past by providing interview prepara-

tion as they approach an important interview but this program formalizes the linkage between job market search and interview preparation with the assistance of Career Services. A second workshop on career preparation was offered just before spring break. Approximately 25 majors and minors from the sophomore and junior classes participated in a resume writing session that focused on the type of resume and kind of information economics majors should include in their resume. Various career and intern-

ship options for economics majors were discussed along with some caveats for students with regard to the use of social media. A third workshop for sophomores and juniors is planned for later in the semester. Topics will include networking and interviewing. The Economics Department's goal is to get majors and minors engaged in the career preparation process early in their academic program to enhance their performance in the job market.

On January 15 and January 21, 2016, Prof. O'Brien and Commissioners Callaghan and Chabot conducted a collective bargaining training program for the business agents of Teamsters Local 251. On April 28, 2015, Prof. O'Brien and Commissioner Chabot conducted an advance steward training program for stewards from several RI unions.
