Greetings from the Department Chair!

As we settle into the Spring semester, I would like to share some of the recent events going on in the Economics Department. First, the Department is hopeful that by the start of the Fall 2019 semester we will have a new member of the faculty. During the Fall semester of 2018 the search committee reviewed over 360 applications for a new, tenure-track position in the Economics Department and selected 25 job candidates for face-to-face interviews at the American Economic Association conference that took place in Atlanta in January. Three of these interviewees were selected for on-campus interviews and now we are moving into the offer stage. All three of the candidates who visited PC were outstanding and we are excited to have one of them join us next Fall.

Another exciting event that took place last semester involved three economics majors (Matthew Carlson, Kathleen Kuzmin and Giana Paolicelli) who worked with a local research firm, BW Research Partnership from Wrentham, MA. The students, supervised by

Phil Jordan of BW Research and Drs. Dong and Lenon of the Economics Department, ultimately produced some unique, empirical research regarding the economics of solar energy. Once completed, the students presented their work to Commissioner Carol Grant of the Rhode Island Office of Energy Resources. Commissioner Grant was greatly impressed with the research and presentation. Congratulations to all of those involved, you represented the College and the Economics Department in a very positive way. BW Research is continuing their relationship with the Economics Department this semester and may continue to do so in the future.

There are many other wonderful things going on the Economics Department, but I will leave those for the next newsletter.

ECON MAJORS EXPERIENCE ECONOMIC CONSULTING

In Fall 2018, three of our economics majors – **Matthew Carlson** ('20), **Kathleen Kuzmin** ('19) and **Giana Paolicelli** ('20) - had an exciting opportunity to experience what it's like to work as economic consultants through their participation in a pilot project with BW Research. BW Research Partnership, with offices in Wrentham, Massachusetts and Carlsbad, California, is an applied research firm specializing in economic and workforce research, customer and community research, strategic planning, and evaluation services, with clients across the world. About one-third of their work is advising state and local governments on clean energy policy and markets and labor market issues.

Over the summer of 2018, Phil Jordan, VP of BW, worked with Dr. Lenon, Economics Career Liaison, to structure the pilot program as an independent study opportunity. Dr. Lenon asked economics faculty to nominate juniors and seniors with strong quantitative and communication skills. Matthew, Kathleen and Giana enthusiastically agreed to join the project and **Dr. Fang Dong**, Assistant Professor of Economics, generously volunteered to act as faculty supervisor for the independent study. Phil Jordan was site supervisor for the project and was assisted by Ryan Young, Research Manager at BW.

BW uses "sprint teams" to manage consulting projects; a sprint team consists of three individuals who work on a variety of related issues that form a larger project. The team collaborates on the project as it proceeds through its various stages and ulti-

mately presents the research as a joint paper. In this case, the work product is a paper entitled "The Determinants of Solar Employment: A Panel Data Model Approach for U.S. and Northeastern U.S. Solar Employment." The sprint team had the added experience of presenting their research to audiences at Providence College and, most notably, to Commissioner Carol Grant, State of Rhode Island Office of Energy Resources, at the RI State House in December.

I sat down with Kathleen, Giana and Matthew recently to talk about their experiences. Kathleen Kuzmin feels the most important part of the project was learning how to adapt

economic theory and empirical results to make the knowledge accessible to the general public. Kathleen has accepted an offer to join the analytics development program at Liberty Mutual after graduation and the experience with economic consulting clearly adds to her sense of self-confidence. All three agreed that the project was a great opportunity to engage in team work that will benefit them in their careers. Giana Paolicelli reports the experience already has paid dividends in her search for an internship: Giana received offers from two very competitive summer internship programs with Fidelity Investments and Brown Brothers Harriman. In interviewing for the internships, Giana reports that at both firms the interviewers were keenly interested in the research project, quizzing her on the dataset the team constructed and the econometric modeling employed. She feels strongly that the consulting experience gave her a distinct advantage over other applicants. Giana has accepted Fidelity's offer and looks forward to using the database management and econometric skills she honed working on the BW project. Matthew Carlson emphasized the experience and skill they acquired dealing with the challenge of constructing such a large dataset and particularly the experience gained in finding the necessary data and then converting it into a dataset they could use to test their model. He also noted the presentation to policymakers at the State House was rewarding because it demonstrated the power the project could have to affect public policy.

All three students offered high praise and thanks to Dr. Dong for her skillful and supportive direction in guiding the team's work.

They appreciate the amount of time she devoted to assisting them in their work and they are grateful for the patience she always had for them throughout the semester.

Phil Jordan praised the work of our student sprint team and made a point to tell me that his firm has run similar programs at other universities but never with such success. He said that our students performed head and shoulders above other teams both because of their incredible work ethic but also because of their superior quantitative and communication skills. The paper was presented to former Secretary of Energy Ernest Moniz and his staff at Energy Futures Initiative, who have been developing a student research competition for graduate students, to support expanding the competition to undergraduates.

BW Research and the Economics Department will extend the sprint team project in the Spring 2018 semester. **Dr. Michael Mathes** has generously agreed to act as faculty supervisor and three economics majors, **Trang Dang** ('19), **Kevin McCordic** ('20) and **Austin Nazca** ('19) will form the new sprint team. In addition, **Dan Keating** ('20) has been chosen by BW to participate in their summer internship program this coming summer.

The Economics Department intends to build on this student consulting experience and is actively seeking another firm with which to partner in the near future.

FACULTY NEWS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Prof. Frank O'Brien and Commissioner Paul Chabot of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service received the Solidarity Award from the Institute of Labor Studies and Research for their longstanding contributions to the cause of industrial peace. The recipi-

ents run training programs for Union and Management practitioners to enable them to improve their skills in dealing with each other.

Dr. James Bailey published “The Effect of the Affordable Care Act on Entrepreneurship among Older Adults” in the *Eastern Economic Journal*. This work was coauthored with Dr. Dhaval Dave from Bentley University.

Dr. Chris Linnios published two articles: “Housing Market and Labor Market Search” (*B.E. Journal of Macroeconomics*) and “Correcting Two Important Aspects of the Labor Market Lesson Plan” (*Journal of*

Economics and Finance Education).

Last fall the faculty of the Economics Department unanimously voted to re-elect **Dr. Leo Kahane** as department chair for the next three years. Dr. Kahane has served in this position since 2016.

COLLEGE FED CHALLENGE 2018

Last fall Providence College participated again in the College Fed Challenge competition held at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston. This year's team included **Emily Mora** ('19), **Sam Roushanaei** ('19), **Kaitlin Rueda** ('20) and **Jon Cicciu** ('19). Economics professors Dr. Nestor Azcona and Dr. Chris Limnios helped the team prepare for the competition. A total of 26 schools from the New England area participated. Each team presented their outlook on the U.S. economy and their monetary policy recommendations. Yale University emerged as this year's New England champion. Their team went on to win the national College Fed Challenge contest held at the Federal Reserve Board in Washington, D.C.


